The Girl Scout Leadership Experience

Girls at every level of Girl Scouting participate in the "leadership experience." A leadership experience is an exciting way of working with girls in a series of themed activities focused on building leadership skills. By enlisting the three keys to leadership (Discover, Connect, and Take Action) girls learn that they can take the lead to make a difference in their community and the world. The three keys are at the heart of the Girl Scout philosophy of leadership:

Discover

Girls understand themselves and their values and use their knowledge and skills to explore the world.

Connect

Girls care about, inspire, and team with others locally and globally.

Take Action Girls act to make the world a better place.

It's not just "what" girls do, but "how." When girls are engaged that creates a high-quality Girl Scout leadership experience. All Girl Scout experiences are built on three processes (*Girl-Led*, *Cooperative Learning*, and *Learning by Doing*) that make Girl Scouting different from school and other extra-curricular activities. When used together, these processes ensure the quality and promote the fun and friendship so integral to Girl Scouting.

Girl-Led

Girls play an active role in the planning and implementation of activities while adults provide age-appropriate facilitation, ensuring that planning, organization, set-up, and evaluation of all activities are done jointly with the girls.

Cooperative Learning

All members of a group work together towards a common goal that can only be accomplished with the help of others.

Learn by Doing

A "hands-on" learning process that engages girls in cycles of action and reflection resulting in deeper understanding of concepts and mastery of practical skills.

When Discover, Connect, and Take Action activities are girl-led and involve learning by doing and cooperative learning, girls achieve the desired and expected leadership outcomes ultimately resulting in Girl Scouting achieving its mission: **Building girls of courage**, **confidence and character**, **who make the world a better place**.





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Local Government





Paralegal: Legal Assistance

Paralegals are employed by lawyers to perform many different specialty tasks, including: Case planning, development, and management. Paralegals attend to legal functions such as the executions of wills, real estate closings, depositions, court or administrative hearings and trials with the attorney. Paralegals work in City Attorney's Office and many other departments in the City of San Antonio to support staff in the research and delivery of legal advice to the Mayor, City Council, boards and commissions, City management and all the City's departments.

What does a City Auditor's Office Do?

The role of the City Auditor is to positively impact process and organizational changes to increase assurance that public resources are used in an effective, efficient, and responsible manner. This is a very important job. The Office of the City Auditor helps both City Management and City Council in their respective management and governance duties by facilitating government accountability to the Citizens of San Antonio through non-partisan, fact-based, independent, objective assessments of City programs, activities, and functions. Most medium and large cities across the U.S. have internal audit offices. In fact, the Association of Local Government Auditors (ALGA) reports that it has 375 member organizations, of which 375 are municipalities. Many other cities in Texas have an internal audit function, including Arlington, Austin, Brownsville, Dallas, El Paso, and Houston. Audits conducted can include process audits. This is where an auditor will review all of the steps in a given process and assess if all steps were followed by reviewing a sample of the work product. In this exercise you will act as an auditor and test a sample of the final product for accuracy. The process is a recipe for trail mix or snack mix. Materials: Number of materials is contingent on the desires and number of girls participating. Paper cups or paper bowls, a permanent marker, plastic sandwich bags, measuring cup, and spoons. A recipe for trail mix, or you can use the ingredients listed below for a snack mix.

✓ Computer, tablet or phone (to access internet)

Set up a workstation where all ingredients are available to be portioned out with a measuring cup or spoon to make one batch of the snack mix per girl. Provide the list of ingredients to each girl in the troop. Ask each girl to take a bowl and measure out each ingredient into the bowl. Once all ingredients are mixed up together, pour into a plastic bag and place in the center of the table.

Ingredients

- 🖊 1 cup Chex mix traditional blend snack mix
- 🖊 5 M & M's plain
- ♣ 5 M & M's peanut
- 24 Raisins
- 12 mini bowtie pretzels
- 12 whole salted cashews
- 🖊 12 goldfish or cheese nips crackers





Once each girl is finished making one batch, pick one girl to be the counter and one girl to be the scribe. For larger troops, you may want to select more than one for each role. The counter will first select 1-3 bags of the snacks to test. The testing will involve having a list of the ingredients for the scribe to check off as the other girl "counts" the ingredients. Once you have completed the testing, report your finding to the group. For example, you might begin by stating, "Of the 3 samples of snack mix we tested, we found that ____ had all of the ingredients listed in the recipe and the correct number of each ingredient. However, one sample was missing ____, and ____." And after you report out, treat yourself to the yummy treats you just made!





Create a Budget

Citizens want to live in a safe, clean city that is easy to get to work. All those things cost money. Cities collect money through taxes. The City of San Antonio collects sales tax and property tax. Accountants in the City of San Antonio's Office of Management & Budget develop a budget based on how much money is collected. If you like numbers and solving problems, you may someday want to be an accountant.

Public Health & Safety





Firefighters and Fire Safety

In every city and county there are firehouses with fire fighters ready to fight fires. Fire fighters also respond to all kinds of emergencies besides fires. What exactly does a firefighter do? You can be a firefighter one day!

For this activity, we are going to learn what firefighters do? Materials: Number of materials is contingent on the desires and number of girls participating.

Create a fire evacuation plan with your family. Think of how all members of your house can get out quickly. If there are pets, a baby or any other family member that needs help, plan who will help them get out.

Have a meet-up place where everyone gathers after they escape the fire. It needs to be far enough away from the fire but close enough, so it is easy to meet the firefighters. You want to be able to tell them if any family members are missing and where they might be and where you think the fire started.

Being Prepared is Key!

For those girl scouts that want to do more: Visit the fire station near your house. Ask the firefighters questions about their job.





Food Safety

Whether we get the pizza to go, have a hamburger at a fast food restaurant or go to a fancy bistro, we assume that the food is safe to eat. This is partly because of the Food Inspectors at the Metropolitan Health District. These are some guidelines for food safety.

- Thaw frozen food in a refrigerator or under running potable water at a temperature of 70 degrees F or lower as part of the cooking process or in a microwave if in smaller quantities. Never thaw at room temperature.
- Wash fruits and vegetables in sinks used only for food preparation. Do not prepare food in the sink used to wash or sanitize dishes or wash hands. ALWAYS use potable water for all food preparation processes.
- Use cleaned and sanitized cutting boards and knives to avoid cross-contamination.
- Prepare pasta, meat, egg, fish, and salads less than 24 hours before service.
- Measure internal food temperatures in several places including the thickest part of the product. Clean and sanitize thermometers before and after each use.
- Never mix new food with old or raw food with cooked.
- Never use hot-holding equipment to cook or reheat food, only to keep food hot.
- Transfer reheated food to holding equipment only when the food is at 165 degrees
- Cook or heat processed foods to the proper internal temperature
- Keep potentially hazardous food, which must remain cold, at 41degrees F or below.
- Keep potentially hazardous food, which must remain hot, at 140 degrees F or above.
- Use pasteurized eggs in all recipes in which eggs are not cooked or cannot be cooked to 145 degrees F or higher.
- When tasting food, ladle a small amount of it into a small dish and taste with a clean spoon. Remove dish and spoon from the area and have them cleaned and sanitized when done.

Are you interested in nutrition? You could work for City of San Antonio as a Nutritionist. The San Antonio Metropolitan Health District is responsible for the health of the citizens and works hard to educate all the citizens about ways they can be healthier. Statistics show that San Antonio citizens lead the way in many illnesses and diseases that are related to food choices. If adults and children made better food choices those illnesses and diseases would decrease.

This city-wide campaign is designed to educate all adults and children about healthy food choices.

The three core campaign messages of this program are:

½ your plate fruits & veggies, every meal, every day For portion control, use a smaller plate Drink water, not sugary drinks

Visit San Antonio's Urban Forest

Are you interested in working in the outdoors? You might one day become San Antonio's City Urban Forester in the Parks and Recreation Department. San Antonio has achieved "Tree City USA" which is a framework for a healthy, sustainable urban forestry program. San Antonio is committed to increasing the number of green spaces available for its citizens. San Antonio has 205 miles of trails and 15,891 areas of City-owned park lands and natural areas. All areas must be monitored by the Urban Forester.



For this activity, we are going to learn about urban forests and find out if there is one near you.

Materials: Number of materials is contingent on the desires and number of girls participating.

An urban forest includes the rivers, ponds, trees and grass. It may be a park or a neighborhood.

With your troop or your family, you can walk around your neighborhood and see if you have an urban forest close by.

Some of the things that urban foresters do are:

- Planting trees to make sure there are more trees in the future.
- Pruning trees in the city to keep trees healthy so they continue to grow, to keep dead branches from hurting people, and to keep branches away from power lines.
- Fighting fire to protect forests from being damaged.
- Help the city plan new building projects so they can protect the city's forests.

For those that want to do more:

Choose one or more of the following activities. You can do them with your troop, family or on your own.

Interview the Urban forester at the San Antonio Parks and Recreation Department. Report back to your troop what you have learned about how to become an urban forester, what they do in their job and any other interesting facts Visit an Urban Forest near your home. You may be very surprised to see how close you are. Take pictures and tell your troop about what you learned







Access for Everyone

In 1990, the United States passed the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This civil rights law requires buildings to be accessible to people with disabilities. This means that people with disabilities have the right to be able to enter and get around any building that is open to the public.

Everyone wants to be fair, but many buildings were built a long time ago. They are not accessible to everyone. It is can be very expensive to change a restaurant, a bakery or any other older building to make it more user friendly to people with disabilities. The Disability Access Office helps small businesses find solutions to fix the problem. One day you might work in this office making sure there is access for everyone in San Antonio.

For this activity, you will walk around your community and look for things that to help people with disabilities get around the city. After you find them, discuss how they help. Some suggestions:

- Doors with buttons that will open the door
- Handles in the bathrooms
- Handles on doors instead of knobs
- Crossing signals (AKA-Audible Pedestrian Signals) that say the color of the light and how much longer
- Bumps on the sidewalk at the street crossing
- Braille or raised pictures on restrooms or any room
- (pictorial symbols)
- Ramps at building entrances.





Helping People in the Community

The Department of Human Services' mission is to promote lifelong success by providing human services and connecting people to community resources. The Department of Human Services provides comprehensive services in the areas of Early Education and Child Care Assistance, Education, Financial and Emergency Assistance, Homeless Assistance, and Senior Services. If you like helping young children, adults or older adults, like neighbors and family members, you could have a career in social work. Individuals who work in the social work field are interested in improving the conditions of those in need of help.

To serve the City's older populations, The Department of Human Services has at least one Comprehensive Senior Center in each of the 10 City Council Districts that provide an array of activities tailored to our older population, such as Daily Nutritious Meals; Arts and Crafts; Exercise Classes; Recreation and Dance; Arts and Crafts; Computer Classes; Basic Health Screenings; Work Search Programs; and Field Trips.

Social workers could serve as Senior Center Managers who are responsible for managing other professional staff to deliver direct services to our older community members. Some of these professionals include Special Activity Coordinators, Nutrition Site Coordinators, and Chauffeurs.

For this activity you will conduct research and learn more about the types of activities provided at each of the centers. You can use this activity as part of your Take Action project. Materials: Number of materials is contingent on the desires and number of girls participating.

- Is there anything that would make your daily life a bit easier?

Convention Center Event Coordination

The City's Convention Center is named for the late U.S. Congressman Henry B. González. The Henry B Gonzalez Convention Center hosts more than 300 events each year with over 750,000 convention delegates from around the world.

The convention center is in downtown San Antonio and helps bring visitors to San Antonio. These visitors spend money in the city, which helps raise money through taxes. These taxes are spent on health, recreation, roads and bridges around San Antonio.

Event Coordinators control an event from conception to clean up. They meet with clients to work out event details, plan with the client and their team, scout and book locations, food, entertainment, staff and cleanup. Event coordinators make sure the shrimp cocktail stays cold and the hired band stays hot. They create budgets and stick to them, as well as organize transportation, hire and wrangle keynote speakers or celebrities, hire A/V teams and equipment, and generally make sure the event runs smoothly, efficiently and handle any crisis that may come up.

It takes many different skills to keep the convention center running efficiently. Watch the video to learn about the convention center.

History is Our Story

"A building does not have to be an important work of architecture to become a first-rate landmark. Landmarks are not created by architects. They are fashioned by those who encounter them after they are built. The essential feature of a landmark is not its design, but the place it holds in a city's memory. Compared to the place it occupies in social history, a landmark's artistic qualities are incidental." - Herbert Muschamp

Historic Preservation is about telling the story of our city, neighborhoods, and homes. We work to preserve our history for many reasons. Ask anyone what they love about San Antonio and the answers you'll likely hear will almost certainly involve historic preservation: the Riverwalk, downtown neighborhoods, the Alamo or the Steve's House, or historic open spaces like Hemisfair or San Pedro Park.

San Antonio's Office of Historic Preservation resolve is to preserve and protect the unique historic structures, archaeological sites, and design features of San Antonio. San Antonio is a unique place in America, and we want to hold on to the things that make it special. Someday you may want to work there and help preserve San Antonio's history.

A bicycle is a vehicle and has a right to be on the road, but common sense should guide decisions about where, when, and how to ride. A cyclist is obligated to make sure their bicycle is in proper working order and is equipped with lights and reflectors. Cyclists should always protect themselves with helmets, appropriate clothing, and water.

Outdoor activities and green spaces are important to everyone's health. The San Antonio Parks and Recreation Department has many different programs for children, youth and adults.

The Department of Parks and Recreation manages over 250 parks. Recreation Specialists plan programs, maintain facilities and keep visitors safe. San Antonio parks include swimming pools, gymnasiums, historic cemeteries, sports facilities, and recreation centers. The department is responsible for the maintenance of 15,337,595 acres of park land, including more than 150 miles of walking, hiking, and biking trails. The park system has many different types of classes and opportunities for all citizens.

For this activity you can design and draw a park. What do you want in your park? Do you want it to have meeting spaces or a swimming pool? Do you want it to be a natural area with the least amount of man-made structures? You decide. You can do it as a group or individual. If you do it on your own show your troop and discuss your design.
