GSUSA suggests a minimum of 20 hours/girl participant is spent on Steps 2-7.

1. Complete a Girl Scout Junior Journey
2. Build your Girl Scout Junior team
3. Explore your community
4. Choose your Girl Scout Bronze Award project
5. Make a plan
6. Put your plan in motion
7. Spread the word
