- □ Visit <u>unicef.org</u> to learn more about the International Day of the Girl: "My voice, my equal future."
- □ Visit the National Women's Hall of Fame online at womenofthehall.org and find out how Lucretia Mott, Susan B. Anthony and Alice Paul played a part in women's rights. Decide which of them you think you're most like.
- Visit Women's Rights National Historical Park online at nps.gov/wori to learn the history of the women's rights movement.
- Visit the Harriet Tubman National Historical Park online at nps.gov/hart and explore her role in women's suffrage. What do you think her most important contribution was?
- Research a modern-day activist like Malala Yousafzai, Yara Shahidi or Emma Gonzales. What do they stand for? How are they advocating for themselves and their beliefs?
- How can you become an activist for something you believe in? Make a plan and share it with your friends or family!

- Set up a vote about something you feel is important, count the votes and make a decision.
- Create your own poster/banner based on a current issue related to women's rights issues. Hang it in a window in your house so people outside can see it.
- ☐ Learn about why women march for their rights.
- ☐ Use fabric markers or paint to create a t-shirt celebrating your rights as a young woman.
- ☐ The right to vote isn't the only right that women fought for in this country. Come up with 3 other rights that you have because women in the past fought for equality.
- Set up a voting station with your family and let everyone vote on what to have for dinner. Then, take away the votes of any girls and see how it changes the results.
- Draw a picture of what you think life would be like if women had not been granted the rights they fought so hard for and post it on our GSNYPENN Live Facebook page.
- Make a digital collage of images related to women's rights—include at least 3 women who made this happen for us.
- ☐ Make a map of the U.S. and in each state write the year it granted women the right to vote.
- Draw a \$100 bill with the face of your favorite suffragette on it to celebrate 100 years of women's rights and share it on our Facebook page.
- □ Draw a comic story featuring you as the main character standing up for something you believe in.

- ☐ Find out how laws are created and passed, on a local, state, or national level. Which law do you think is most important? Discuss it with your family!
- ☐ Get to know who is running for U.S. president in 2020 and what he believes in, decide what you agree with and what you don't. Who would you vote for, and why?
- ☐ Find out what it means to be a Democrat, Republican or Independent. Which party do you think you are?
- Create your own political party. What do you stand for? Name your party, write down what your core beliefs are and draw your party's mascot. Explain why you chose it.
- Research a woman in your area who is involved with government on any level, find out how they got into it and why they like it (try sending her a message via email or an actual letter).
