Did You Know?

Women represent fewer than one in three scientific researchers in the world — which means that when scientific projects are designed and data is analyzed, it's most often done without the benefit of a woman's perspective.

Citizen science is a way for everyday people — like your girl! — to participate in and help professional scientists advance research by collecting or analyzing data and sharing observations. Having your Girl Scout participate in citizen science helps level the playing field for girls in STEM and ensures she'll have the scientific skills and curiosity to go far in the future.

Help Her Lead at Home
