Women in the U.S. Senate

- 71% of female senators are Girl Scout alums.
- There will be a total of 24 women out of 100 senators (24%) in the 116th Congress. Of these 24, 17 are Girl Scout alums.

The total number of female senators increased by one (1%).

Women in the 116th Congress

- 59% of female members of the 116th Congress are Girl Scout alums.
- There will be a total of 130 women out of 541 members (24%) of the 116th Congress. Of these 130, 77 are Girl Scout alums.

Women in the U.S. House of Representatives

- 57% of female representatives and delegates are Girl Scout alums.
- There will be a total of 106 women out of 441 representatives and delegates (24%) in the 116th Congress. Of these 106, 60 are Girl Scout alums.

- **Jahana Hayes** will become Connecticut's first black congresswoman.
- **Veronica Escobar** and **Sylvia Garcia** will become Texas's first Latina congresswomen.
- **Marsha Blackburn** will become Tennessee's first female senator.
- **Rashida Tlaib** and **Ilhan Omar** will become the first Muslim American women in Congress.
- **Deb Haaland** and **Sharice Davids** will become the first Native American women in Congress.
- **Janet Mills** will become Maine's first female governor.
- **Kristi Noem** will become South Dakota's first female governor.
- **Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez** and **Abby Finkenauer** became the youngest women ever elected to Congress.

Girl Scout Alums in Elected Office 116th Congress and 2019 Governorships
